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## **Motorcycle Action Group: National Committee Meeting**

Date: February 08, 2020 Time 12.00 pm Venue: Honiley Court Hotel, Honiley Rd, Honiley, Kenilworth CV8 1NP

## 1. Introduction:

SL thanked all for attending and dealt with housekeeping.

All introduced themselves.

## 2. Apologies for absence:

Recorded on attached attendance sheet.

## 3. Appointments and resignations:

Richard Manton, Steve Mallett and George Legg all returned as Regional Reps.

## 4. Adoption of NC agenda:

Adopted without revisions.

## 5. Ratification of previous NC Minutes:

i. Minutes of previous NC meeting.

To accept the December 2019 NC Minutes.

Proposed: Paul Carter; Seconded: Tim Peregrine. Carried.

ii. Minute of any email votes taken between NC meetings.

None.

## 6. Matters arising from previous NC Minutes:

Circulated and amended.

It was noted that the Police Crime Commissioners elections are likely to take place around 07/05/20 and that motorcycle theft statistics have been uploaded to the MAG Wiki; Reps should contact the office if they wish to request relevant laminated details for display stands.

An FOI request for 2020 statistics will be sent out in February with the aim of publishing the results prior to the PCC elections.

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There was a short discussion regarding motorcycle ownership in electoral areas.

## 7. <u>Campaigns/Priorities</u>:

The Campaigns report was taken following the Board report due to NFL and PW attending at 1.00 pm for this section of the meeting.

(NFL and PW join the meeting)

LÖ and CB presented a run-down of activities since the last NC meeting. It was noted that Boris Johnson now has a motorbike, that Brexit has happened, that opportunities to present the case for motorcycling will be taken where available and that a stable Government going forward should be helpful in making the case. MAG is currently endeavouring to get a Parliamentary debate regarding modal shift from four wheels to two.

Chris Law has been re-elected as APPMG Chair and MAG will work with the Group regarding questions in the House, etc. It was noted that there is a need to get them doing more than they are currently.

There has been contact with former Secretary of State for Transport, Chris Grayling MP.

It was noted that MCIA's CEO, Tony Campbell, had been scheduled to attend this section of the meeting put had had to postpone this arrangement due to unforeseen circumstances. He is now scheduled to attend the April meeting.

NFL asked about Mr Campbell's background and LÖ said he had come from Piaggio and before that the automotive industry.

Oxford is to introduce a Zero Emissions Zone (ZEZ) via a complex proposal with several phases. CB has submitted a response to the consultation and noted that the input regarding the first green zone will inform that of the following red zone.

Mike Penning has stated that so-called smart motorways are killing people and CB requested that smart motorways and motorcycling be put on the agenda. There have been two legal cases so far regarding deaths that have occurred in smart lanes.

Several allies are being cultivated, including:

A meeting was obtained with British Cycling where CB met with their Policy Manager.

A connection with IAM RoadSmart has already yielded the information that more motorcycle riders take advanced training than car drivers. They are looking for feedback from MAG regarding issues they can campaign on.

A meeting with Park Mark (a national secure car park accreditation organisation) went well and they are looking forward to including both disabled and secure motorcycle parking. This is being trialled in Leeds and W. Yorks and there are opportunities to include MAG branding.

CB is to present at a Road Safety conference hosted by the National Young Riders Forum, a relatively new group looking at safety for younger riders.

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MAG is now leading on Ride2Work Day, which is scheduled to take place on 15/06/20, with a launch event coming up on 13/05/20. SL will bring advertising flyers to the next NC meeting.

There is a possibility of piggybacking on British Cycling's Ride2Work week also.

There is an article about recruitment in The Road along with a membership form.

LÖ observed that MAG is the most person-efficient organisation he has ever worked for.

CB noted that MAG needs to make itself relevant to organisations that it may be able to work with.

Keith Prince AM is an ally and very supportive of MAG generally. He also has contact with Sean Bailey, the only realistic opposition to Sadiq Khan for the position of Mayor of London.

TF has requested volunteers to assist on the MAG stand at the Excel Motorcycle Show, taking place over the weekend of 14-16/02/20.

FairFuel UK are looking for volunteers to test a fuel additive that reduces the amount of energy required for a starting burn of fuel. LÖ has been using this additive and considered that it had improved fuel consumption efficiency.

DW asked why FF are not using commercial accredited labs for this work and was advised that they had approached two such companies, but it had not worked out. Their goal is to see the additive used at production level rather than remaining an after-market additive.

MAG is interested in this project because it may lend weight to the emissions issue.

Clarification has been sought regarding a potential end to use of internal combustion engine (ICE) vehicles. There has been an announcement regarding bringing a ban on all non-electric car sales forward to 2035. LÖ described this announcement as a "broad ambition" at this stage. CB has been in touch with DfT, who have confirmed that any ban does not include motorcycles at this stage. Following on from this contact, MAG is now a stakeholder for meetings.

New data suggesting that such a ban is unfeasible was presented at an "End of ICE and petroleum in transport" conference, presented by Gautam Kalghatgi FREng, FSAE, FIMechE FISCES.

It was noted that full electrification is not possible and that a more workable scenario will be to bring this in for personal transport, but not for HGV, ships, planes, etc.

The available infrastructure is insufficient to support the demands that will be put upon it, and is also cost-prohibitive. Mr Kalghatgi predicts that no more than 10-20% of transport energy will be supplied by electricity by 2040.

Summing up, it was put to NC that the problem is the threat to end of ICE machine sales for reasons of environment and health. LÖ considered that MAG has two options going forward: defend motorcycles as an interim solution or challenge the core logic of the proposal.

It was noted that although places such as supermarkets are likely to offer charging points, if they require more than four, they would require a substation to support them. This would be prohibitively expensive and in the event of a power outage, would be the first things to be shut down.

SL observed that MAG cannot do nothing and that there needs to be a decision on what the Political Unit and the organisation should do going forward.

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There were several thoughts expressed regarding how feasible successful electrification really is. PS said he felt that CAZs are a bigger threat and that, in the event that the ICE is saved, there may, in reality, be few places where it can be used.

NFL observed that, throughout history, reasonable compromise is what moves things forward and usually happens; in this scenario, all stakeholders give up something but there is enough in the solution to keep them all happy enough to go along with it.

He further observed that MAG's "giveaway" in the fight to preserve ICE would be supporting electrification in cities; i.e. public transport and cars for short commutes.

He said that the loss of ICE would potentially result in a reduced standard of living for many, and that electrification should concentrate on areas where it will work best; i.e. buses, trams, etc.

NFL then went on to put a proposal to NC that he felt would be an appropriate way of campaigning on this issue. He explained that it would be called ChiPT (Choice in Personal Transport) and would involve media-led campaigning that would be done by an employed social media team with the considerable funding investment coming from relevant big industry such as oil companies and vehicle manufacturers.

ChiPT would be a separate entity from MAG with no risk to MAG. NFL observed that LÖ would be the best man for leading on this, being part of a great campaigns team where LÖ has the contacts and CB the technical know-how. He further stated he was willing to be involved on a strategic level but not to run it.

He closed his presentation by stating that "if you're going to save motorcycling, you've got to mobilise car drivers".

In response to a question regarding funding of a new organisation, NFL explained that he is not looking for a large financial investment from MAG, just some hours from LÖ. He also noted, in response to concerns regarding a perception of 'throwing our lot in' with cars, that whilst there would be participation there would be no attachment.

He went on to note that LÖ has appropriate contacts and that he (NFL) would look to identify appropriate social media marketing personnel.

PS expressed concerns that with the increase in CAZs, we could win the 'big war' but have nowhere to ride.

DW noted that technology is moving quickly and cited an example of testing of dump trucks running on hydrogen. NFL said that technology eventually overtakes what is currently in use and then things move across to it.

SM observed that it is a 'quantum leap' to go from two employees to taking on the world.

(CB, SW and DW leave the meeting)

AC noted that with LÖ having previously reduced his hours, there would be capacity to increase them in line with NFL's suggestion. He also noted that if, with new technology, the goalposts move, we adapt. Finally, he stated that if there is no funding, there is no campaign.

RM said that no-one is denying climate change, but there is scepticism regarding how much humans are contributing to it. He said there had been no mention of ChIPT at AGC and asked for a brief explanation.

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NFL stated that he does not envisage it as a member-led organisation; more as a vested-interest that will mobilise voters.

PS asked about the potential structure of a new organisation; i.e. would it be a limited company?, a small operation?. He also mentioned the success of Extinction Rebellion as a social media movement.

SL stated that a full exploration is needed to look at the practicalities of setting up such an organisation and it was noted that NFL's proposal is actually Option 1 discussed earlier.

SL summed up in the form of a proposal to NC:

NFL to bring a full, costed proposal to the NC regarding setting up ChiPT. NFL to liaise with LÖ as part of this process and to research whether it is possible to draw down appropriate and sufficient funding from big business. Proposal to be brought to NC within six months of this February 2020 NC meeting.

Proposed: SL; Seconded: RM. Carried.

TC observed that the biggest threat faced is from autonomous vehicles, not electrification. He noted that there is still research into ICE and alternative fuels, and that MAG must not lose focus on two-wheel, single-track vehicles.

(NFL and PW leave the meeting)

## 8. Board meeting report (including FEMA):

Apologies received from IC due to attending the FEMA AGM. There were no interim Skype meetings. No appointments or resignations. Minutes of previous meeting accepted.

Monthly Direct Debits will go live at the end of the month, in time for the Manchester Show where there will also be locks provided by Oxford to issue to visitors. DD forms will use the 7<sup>th</sup> of the month to collect monies and there will be advertising in The Road and Network along with a crib sheet for those working stands. Approval for an on-line joining facility has yet to be approved.

JS will obtain a log-in from Pensord for Board members.

The Board is to complete Myers Briggs training and JS will endeavour to arrange for this to take place prior to April's Board meeting. There is a possibility of social media training for NC members also.

FEMA has requested a joint MAG/BMF statement following Brexit.

Following a question via social media in relation to the Harry Dunn incident, SL to formally approach MAG's Foundation regarding supply of "drive on the left" stickers for hire cars driven by personnel from other countries/military bases.

GH stated that there seems to be an appetite for demonstrations at the moment regarding this matter and DW suggested that caution should be exercised otherwise the US may never comply with the extradition order served on the person involved in this case, using the excuse that they will not receive a fair trial.

Website and I.T. matters are progressing with training arranged. There is a possibility that the website may be in a position to go live around April.

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SL has conducted JS annual review.

JS to submit information regarding industry standard pay increases to NEL, who will then take a recommendation to the TMAGL Board.

AC has reviewed MAG's social media statistics following a request to increase the amount of content being posted. He subsequently monitored the output of posts throughout January using national figures, excluding specific events, competitions, etc. He noted that training guidelines regarding social media output in relation to getting maximum impact from those posts state that less is more. It is clear from the official guidelines that increasing the number of posts would not increase the number of likes, comments and shares, the figures for which are very good and considerably better than those for a similar organisation used for comparison.

AC observed that there is room to improve the quality of posts, particularly relating to visual content, but that in all other respects, MAG's posts are balanced and at the right level.

It was noted that Twitter and Instagram could be utilised to a greater extent.

PS asked whether the 2035/bike ban issue had been resolved and was advised by CB that the relevant information had been received and a PR subsequently released.

MAG has taken on Ride2Work Day and the Board has approved a £5K budget for a professional promotional video to be made, with the proviso that the main part of the video will not be timesensitive so that it can be used in part for other events. It is also hoped to generate a number of new stills to refresh MAG's imagery going forward.

SL asked for a show of hands to indicate that the NC is happy with the work of the Board, which was forthcoming.

Scotland: Steve Wykes

Friday 6th December took part in Board meeting by Skype.

Saturday 7th December Attended NC Meeting at Honiley.

Thursday 23rd January Participated in Scottish Road Safety Framework Workshop.

This workshop was part of a series looking at the future aims and targets for the Road Safety Framework to 2030 and beyond. While to date the targets originally set for reduction in KSI and injuries to 2020 from the baseline figures, were for the most part achieved, although serious injury figures failed to reduce below the target set. Consultants had suggested that realistic targets for 2030 taking all forecasts and predictions for traffic, technological and population changes into account, would be a further 40% reduction of Casualties. Despite these predicted targets being advised as realistic the OPG have decided to set more challenging target reductions of 50% for all casualties and a totally un-realistic Target reduction in child deaths of 100% with an equally unrealistic goal of making Scotland roads and road users the safest in the World. These may be fine as aspirations but are unlikely to be even close to being achieved without dramatic changes in funding, licensing and draconian interventions. Further public consultation is set to take place in February/March.

Apart from the above have attended Edinburgh and Glasgow local meetings and dealing with emails.

South East: Steve Mallett

Aylesford motorcycle parking, the continuing saga. We continue to work with Tracey Crouch MP and have also brought Triumph Owners, Bexley on board. Their Roger Roud is Deputy Mayor of Tonbridge and Malling and he is keen to get involved.

Tracey Crouch was on BBC radio Kent this morning (27<sup>th</sup> Jan) speaking about the danger of smart motorways on the eve of the M20 becoming 'Smart'. MAG SE have offered to assist in any way we can with her campaign.

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Prior to the General Election I wrote to all the candidates in Gravesham (Cons, Lib, Lab and Green) putting the 5 questions recommended by MAG some months ago + an additional one about the Lower Thames Crossing. The one thing they had in common was an aversion to 'pay for access roads' with particular reference to the LTC.

The LTC are holding yet more consultations around our area. Although outwardly they are keen to speak in general terms about their wonderful plans, they remain very elusive when approached on specifics, i.e. Tolls and L plate m/c access.

Subsequently spoke to Highways England on their '0300' generic line and asked for details of tolls. Also, pointed out that the latest report on modifications to the LTC, in light of previous consultation, is not accessible via the latest LTC fb link. All this info will (can you believe it?) be sent to me personally by email 'within 14 working days'.

29/1/20 spoke on a BBC radio Kent phone-in about the LTC. Tolls, access and the fact that it is routing heavy traffic from Northern Europe, via the Channel ports and most of it then goes to the Midlands and North of England. A joined-up transport policy would surely promote a vastly improved ferry link from Holland to, say, Immingham. This would relieve the traffic chaos in Kent and Essex.

We held our SE AGM on Jan 26<sup>th</sup>, 26 x members, 1x non-member + observer attended. Many thanks to Tim Peregrine for observing.

The same Officers (Self, JC Quinton, Chris Atkins) were elected, in spite of several group emails urging others to get involved.

In AOB GDPR was discussed; there is a general dissatisfaction with the restrictions this places upon Reps when they want to contact members/chase up lapsed members. I hope to put this before the NC with a few suggestions.

The 2020 SE rally is gathering momentum again under the guidance of Brighton MAG's Sandy Moon with bands and entertainers booked already.

In summer 2019 Hampshire RPU completed 5 operations carried out (3 on Wednesdays, 2 on Sundays). 19 x Cars/Vans stopped & 55 x Motorcycles stopped. Unfortunately, the results played into the Group's hands and include; 24 x offences of excess speed & 33 x offences of altered exhausts although it is unknown what the vehicle groups were for these.
- Direct council contact for "meet the Contractor for the Stubbington Bypass" event.
- Deputy Rep is attending Road Safety Forum South one of Hampshire's three forums.
- Deputy Rep is attending Portsmouth Transport Liaison Group. Portsmouth is one of 61 local authorities mandated by central government to improve air quality within the "shortest possible time", which can't be achieved by not charging, so Portsmouth City Council are proposing to introduce a class B Clean Air Zone; Buses, coaches, taxis, PHVs and heavy goods vehicles (HGVs), So no charge for private cars or PTW's...... yet! However, should these measures not lower pollution levels sufficiently, further charges could / would follow. PCC has funding in place

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to provide a further 79 charge points for electric vehicles within the city. They are also planning road improvements to support public transport movements.


## vii. Finance and membership figures

Memberships taken by Bikesure via Go Compare issues have now been resolved and started to come through early in January (after the 15-day cooling off period). The total period without referral's was 2.5 months. The number of new memberships taken for the same period last year was 71 compared to 5 in the current year in comparison. Since coming back online new memberships taken during 2018/9 was 25 compared to 24 this year, so we are back on target. Renewals in comparison for the same period were 12 last year and 16 this year.


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The Motorcycle Action Group Limited financial report up to end of December 2019. All accounts were signed off in December and have been submitted accordingly.

The below graph shows that memberships by month have decreased during October, November and slightly in December (including the reduction of Bikesure memberships). As previously reported April 2019 we were 55 new memberships down, May 36, October 35, November 73 and December 29 new memberships down and in January renewals were 59 and February 26 memberships down. Over the whole year in comparison to last we were a total of 309 memberships down.



At the end of 2019 the cummulative member figures has seen a decrease of 361 members in comparison to 2018 we are currently running at an slightly improved state when compared to 2016 but are below 2017 figures.



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

#### POLITICAL UNIT WRITTEN REPORTS: COLIN BROWN

## **Resource Library**

No significant progress since last report. It is apparent that no lull in other work will happen. I will schedule ½ day per week in February in an attempt to restart this project.

#### **Clean Air Zones**

Despite bizarre press coverage celebrating the exemption of motorcycles in Bath's CAZ (I do not see this as a stand-out case as there is no charge for private cars either) the CAZ issue continues to be relatively stable. With focus shifting more to a raft of announcements about banning private vehicle journeys altogether. Again, these are over dramatized in the media and are still in very early stages. We must be mindful of potential impacts but equally avoid fear mongering and disinformation.

I have engaged closely on the Oxford Zero Emission Zone and responded to the latest consultation. Allegedly there is no appetite to extend the Red Zone boundaries and the later phases revert to straight forward CAZ plans based on Euro ratings as opposed to CO2 emissions. This is however contradicted by some of the consultation documentation that states an ambition for a city wide zero emission zone by 2035. This clearly needs close monitoring and getting the voice of motorcycling involved in the later phase development work.

I am also engaging with the Welsh Clean Air Plan. They have rejected promotion of ICE motorcycles but there is an opening to promote electric motorcycles. I will be looking to develop this as they are not simply stopping at cycling. This may be a partial win only, but the very fact that the word motorcycle could appear in plans for modal shift is potentially an enormous paradigm shift.

My meeting with Andy Mayo confirmed all my conclusions on the state of transport modelling software and thinking. This is an area with potential in my view that can be explored further but will require academic research and therefore political will for funding.

## Crime/Secure Parking

Having met again with BPA/West Yorkshire Police on the accreditation for motorcycles in the Park Mark scheme, there is good progress here. The initial pilot will focus on Leeds and getting the city council buy in will be key here. The Council has funds to spend on secure motorcycle parking so demonstrating that use of these funds has enabled the motorcycle accreditation should help sway their decision to support the scheme.

## **MCIA**

Tony Campbell's presentation to the NC is now delayed till the April NC

## **Road Safety**

MAG engagement with TfL's VZ tem was alluded to in the latest response on ULEZ, but still no progress on this front. \*\*\*

I am meeting British Cycling on 29<sup>th</sup> Jan to discuss common ground. Still awaiting date for meeting with Neil Greig, Policy & Research Director for IAM

Had some communication with DfT stats department briefly then they went dark again. Hopefully securing meetings with ministers will help in terms of engagement with the department.

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## **ULEZ Campaign**

Written response to August's letter finally received. Once again, the subject has been delegated further down the food chain and the substantive response has not changed or created any further justification for their position. Mayoral candidate Sean Bailey has confirmed his opposition to the extension of ULEZ though this is not a motorcycle specific position.

#### **Bus Lanes**

Continuing progress at the usual snail's pace. The Oxford ZEZ has provided an unexpected opportunity as all motorcycle movements in their mostly pedestrianised Red Zone are the result of their policy to not allow motorcycle access through bus gates.

## **Transport Policy**

No significant progress to report here, but engagement continues particularly with EEH and WMCA. Birmingham City's Transport Plan has hit the headlines with its promotion of a Ghent-style circulation cells system. I have a meeting scheduled with Cllr Waseem Zaffar following my attendance at the launch event.

## Ride to Work Day

Next meeting with the Northamptonshire team is scheduled for first week of February. The website work has started, and Julie has arranged Wordpress training to help with this. I am pushing for further discussion with Highways England, and plan discussions with IAM and Wheels To Work Association.

## POLITICAL UNIT WRITTEN REPORTS: LEMBIT ÖPIK

## Stability in The House

The General Election has cleared the air in Parliament. Conservative Prime Minister Boris Johnson is in a commanding position, and nobody can seriously challenge his authority. MAG is obliged to work with him and his Government in the interests of biking. There is no latitude for partisanship here. We must work with who's in charge and he's in charge.

The good news is that the Prime Minister received a motorcycle from his girlfriend as a present. This is an opportunity for MAG to invite Mr Johnson to join MAG – and to endorse biking as a 'good' thing. MAG has approached sources close to the Prime Minister to see if he will agree. Worryingly, Mr Johnson has stated his goal to begin to ban ICE power by 2035. We need to get clarity on this and recognise that could effectively end development of petrol engines now.

Separately, as expected, there has been no change at the top of the Department for Transport. Grant Shapps continues in post and we are still trying to access him for a meeting.

## **London Mayor candidates**

After a huge amount of effort by London Regional Rep Tim Fawthrop and Lembit Öpik, we secured responses to our Mayor Candidate questions from three parties: Conservative, Green and Liberal Democrat. Two did not reply: Labour (Sadiq Khan) and Independent (Rory Stewart).

All the responses we received should be published in The Road.

#### **Brexit**

Brexit 'happened' – on 31<sup>st</sup> January 2020 - but few people can see any difference. That's not surprising. The work to define Brexit has only just begun. The Government claims it can complete this task by the end of this year. That's unlikely, but they will make some progress.

For MAG, the main thing is to seek exemptions for the UK in those areas we think there is no real benefit to adopting EU regulations. Our action is to speak with the relevant officers of Parliament – over matters including safety regulations and ABS standards.

#### **Parliament**

We are seeking to secure a Parliament debate, led by Chris Law MP. Both the Minister's office and the MP are aligned on this at present, so it's a matter of getting a date.

## Campbell

Tony Campbell, the head of MCIA, was not able to attend our meeting of NC for personal reasons. He will present his strategic position at the April 2020 meeting.

## Recruitment

Following feedback from colleagues, the videos are not going to be used as a major tool right now. However, we commence an extensive campaign of action, requesting direct input from all the NC members. Recruitment at this time is particularly important because of the multiple threats facing our right to ride, ranging from stolen road space to the spectre of banning petrol engines.

#### **Environment**

The Political Unit is awaiting the outcome of the debate in NC regarding Neil Liversidge's proposal to take clear action on the environmental agenda in order to protect riding. We will be guided by what the NC decides.

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
